

Entonox

Entonox is a medical gas 50%Oxygen 50% Nitrous Oxide – used as a form of inhalation pain relief in many medical settings, in Obstetrics it is used in Labour.

'Although nitrous oxide is considered a safe option for pain relief during childbirth, prolonged exposure to the gas could lead to vitamin B₁₂ deficiency and anaemia and has been linked to fertility problems. (BMJ

27 January 2023)





Nitrous Oxide is classed as a hazardous substance, which if exposure to such substances is not properly controlled may cause ill health in a number of ways.

It is a legal requirement under the COSHH regulations that staff are not exposed to hazardous substances, such as nitrous oxide, above the



Working Exposure Limit (WEL).

For Nitrous Oxide, the exposure limit is set at 100ppm,8-hour time weighted average.



So, what has been happening?

During August 2018 and December 2022, there were 11 notifications to the HSE from seven NHS trusts and one private hospital, in relation to nitrous oxide - almost all relating to maternity units.

Recently more trusts have been added to the list. Some have withdrawn Entonox as an option for medical gas analgesia, in maternity and other clinical settings, whilst alterations/upgrades to the extraction of Nitrous Oxide have been made.





So, what has been happening?

This has attracted the attention of the press with various TV and social media reporting

NB: The RCM are **not advocating** the withdrawal of Entonox as an option for Women to use as a medical gas analgesic during pregnancy. RCM call for all NHS Trust's Health Boards and private employers to perform their legal duties and provide safe healthy working environments undertaking COSHH mandated monitoring in all areas including maternity services in acute and community settings.
